In memoriam to another strong supporter of CFKA, Geoff Sandiford, we launched the Community Builder Award, in recognition of an individual who is responsible for significant positive change in our community. Brigadier General (retired) Bill Richard was the inaugural recipient.

As you will read in the following pages, 2018 was another successful year for the Foundation. Highlights include \$1.3 million in donations, 6 new funds established, total granting of

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\$719,540, and publication of our 10th annual Vital Signs report.

In 2018 WE MOVED TO OUR NEW HOME



Community Grants GRANTS AND RECIPIENTS

The Community Grants Program provides grants each year to support projects undertaken by charitable organizations within the greater Kingston area. It is funded each year from earnings on 40 individual endowment funds established at the Foundation by generous donors. There are two granting rounds per year, with applications due Feb. 15 and Sept. 15 each year.

To date, the Foundation has funded

On January 26th, the Community Foundation hosted a special Speaker Series event to celebrate the inaugural recipient of our Community Builder Award - Brigadier General (retired) Bill Richard.



Continuing the theme of "community building" the award presentation was followed by a keynote address by Liz Weaver, Co-CEO of Tamarack Institute, an organization that helps facilitate community change. In her presentation "How Engaged Citizens Can Transform a Community", she encouraged us all to become engaged citizens in our own community, offering the simple manifesto, "Use your heads, your hands and your heart to effect lasting change".

A true community builder, Bill has worked tirelessly as an advocate for the health of veterans and has contributed his time and expertise to many community organizations in Kingston.

The capacity audience, including Mayor Bryan Paterson and members of the military, heard about Bill's impressive impact on many community organizations in Kingston and area. During his term as Base Commander, he was able to unite the military and the local community. Later, he joined the City Strategic Planning group, Focus Kingston; the Kingston General Hospital Board; and became Chair of Imagine Kingston. Bill is passionate about the health of veterans, soldiers, and their families and was the co-founder of the Canadian Institute for Military and Veteran Health Research at Queen's University. Food Security REGINA ROSEN FOOD FIRST FUND

Regina (Gini) Rosen was a community leader who played a huge part in the success of the Community Foundation. Sadly, she passed away in August 2018. Gini was such an integral part of the Foundation since its very beginning that her influence has been embedded into the fabric of who we are and what we do – including our work in the area of food security.

The Regina Rosen Food First Fund (or "RRFFF') was established by the Foundation's Board of Directors in 2012. It was named in Gini's honour in recognition of her exceptional involvement with the Foundation for decades and her passion for ensuring access to healthy food for all.

The "RRFFF" grants one \$1,000 grant each month (for a total of \$12,000 per year) to a different organization working to alleviate hunger in our community through the procurement, production, preservation, preparation, or education and skill development.

To date the Fund has granted over \$65,000 to various charities in the Kingston area.

10th Anniversary VITAL SIGNS® LAUNCHED OCTOBER 15



The launch program featured a presentation by Judi Wyatt, co-founder of The Poverty Challenge, and Reanna King, whose lived experience made her a poverty expert. Mike Bell, CEO, Kingston Community Health Centres, focused on how health equity can improve the mental and physical health outcomes for the poor. Foundation Board Member Dr. Ian Gemmill moderated the Q & A session.

We have concluded that CFKA should publish *Vital Signs* less frequently. There will, however, be a measure of the City's wellbeing; Sustainable Kingston in partnership with the City will track a group of similar indicators; imitation is the finest form of flattery! CFKA will fill the intervals between its periodic *Vital Signs* community reports with Community Conversations, shorter thematic focuses upon issues affecting community wellbeing.

"Taking the Pulse of Our Community"

Our 10th annual *Vital Signs* report compared selected indicators used in *Vital Signs* 2009 with similar indicators in 2018. Some showed improvement over the decade (Sense of Community Belonging), some showed alarming increases (rates of Obesity and Overweight). And, new threats like the opioid crisis are threatening community wellbeing. We also focused on the theme of Poverty, revealing that vulnerable groups (lone parents, Indigenous population, visible minorities, and immigrants) are experiencing much higher rates of poverty in our area.

Operating REVENUES & EXPENDITURES

*Investment Income reflects market returns (losses) earned on our Operating Endowment Fund along with market returns (losses) earned on the temporary investment of unrestricted surplus funds by the Foundation.

** The Office Move was a major expense in 2018 which had been budgeted for from previous years surplus. The Move came in on budget.

2018 Performance Results

Excluding the Office Move, the Foundation's operating expenses are up only slightly over the prior year. Much of this increase in expenses is associated with Information Technology (up ~\$6,500 in order to provide enhanced services to provide better cyber security), and Rent (up ~\$8,000 in our new location, which provides us more, fully accessible space).

Note: We draw income from our Operating Endowment Fund each year to fund current year operations. Following our spending policy, the payout rate is based on the 3-year average rate of return. In 2018, we drew \$63,000 from our Operating Endowment Fund (2017 – \$58,000). Excluding the Office Move and using the approved budget/actual funds transferred for Investment Income, the Foundation realized an operating surplus in 2018.
