It takes a village ...


Each one of us can have a role to play in creating safe places for children, youth,

and families.

The recent fatal stabbing in our community emphasizes the importance of the Foundation's recent exploration of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs).

The impact of exposure to ACEs on behaviour and physical and mental health can be profound and lifelong. (See our *Community Insights* report, The Public Health Crisis of Our Time? at cfka.org/ACEs)

Through our exploration I have met some incredibly passionate professionals. They are eager to take the knowledge we have of ACEs to change the way our community supports children, youth, and families to achieve better life-time outcomes. These champions for change need our support.



There are no easy fixes. It will need the synergies of connection, exploration, and mutual support of each other's work: systemic change is hard.

In the first of two Foundationsponsored screenings in October, we brought community leaders together to view the documentary *Resilience: The Biology of Stress and the Science of Hope.* It shows how we can put the science informing ACEs into action to build resiliency in our children, youth, and families. I was thrilled by the response and the eagerness of the many organizations to arrange viewings for their staff and stakeholders.

Community momentum is building around this issue. Let's work together to make some changes:

We Make Grants!

Since 1995 our Community Grants Program has invested over \$3 million in 346+ local charities. All local charities are eligible to apply to the Community Foundation for Kingston & Area for project grant support. The Foundation accepts applications twice yearly.

Spring Grants 2019: 18 grants totaling \$162,539 were awarded to local charities directly benefiting over 6,500 people, 73% being youth.
